The Township Newsletter is published twice each year by the Board of Commissioners of Upper Moreland Township for the benefit of our residents

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A lot has been happening since my last newsletter article. The Township has been aggressively seeking outside funding for transportation projects, intently developing a master plan for a township park, and carefully planning for long-range capital projects.

Woodlawn Park

Last year the Township acquired the old Woodlawn Elementary School. This past spring, the township's contractor began demolishing the building. It is anticipated that the demolition work will be completed this summer, after which, grass seed will be applied in the fall.

Several months ago, the Township contracted with Simone Collins, a landscape architectural firm that specializes in park master planning, to assist the township in developing a master plan for Woodlawn Park. This master planning process is intended to be guided by extensive public input and participation.

A Steering Committee has been appointed, consisting of Woodlawn Park neighbors and other interested stakeholders, including representatives of local youth sports organizations, teens, and park neighbors. The purpose of the Steering Committee is to listen to public input, consider the characteristics of the park's features, consider the many suggestions that will be made, and make a formal recommendation to the Board of Commissioners. The Commissioners will approve the final master plan.

The planning process began just a few months ago with Steering Committee meetings, community meetings, and several focus group meetings. At the conclusion of the planning process, it is expected that well over a dozen meetings will have been held to help the Steering Committee develop its recommendation to the Board of Commissioners.

It is anticipated that the master plan will be completed by the end of the year. Implementation of the master plan, depending upon what it includes, will likely take a few years to complete.

Willow Grove Interchange

As I wrote in our last newsletter, for many years the township has recognized that improvements were necessary at the Willow Grove interchange of the PA Turnpike. Southbound traffic (coming down from Blair Mill Rd.) experiences significant congestion during many times of the day as a result of only one southbound travel lane being available to access the turnpike. According to traffic engineers, the solution is to add an additional southbound lane and widen the off ramp to include two lanes as well.

To accomplish this, a new bridge on Easton Rd. (Rt. 611) will be constructed to include an additional lane. The cost to build a new bridge and add a travel lane on the off ramp will likely exceed \$12 million. Last fall, the Township secured a state of Pennsylvania CFA Multi Modal grant in the amount of \$1.65 million to design the new bridge and off ramp widening.

This past spring we were excited to learn that the township was awarded a \$1.3 million grant from the Penn DOT Multi Modal program. These funds will be used to construct the widening of the off ramp.

The township will continue to work closely with our state representatives Rep. Guenst and Sen. Collett to secure state funding and begin working with Congresswoman Dean to secure federal funds for construction of the new bridge.

Township Building Renovation and Police Station Expansion

The Township Building, which houses the township's administrative functions (Codes,

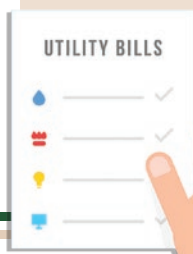

Advisory Planning Agency The APA makes recommendations to the Board of Commissioners on proposed amendments to Title 9, "Land Development and Subdivision" and Title 10, "Zoning," of the Township Code of Upper Moreland.

Environmental Advisory Council Serves to educate and inform Township residents about issues of environmental importance to the community.

Historical Commission In July of 2001, the Upper Moreland Board of Commissioners passed an Historic Preservation Ordinance to encourage preservation of sites significant to the history and development of the Township and to establish a Historical Commission chartered with administering that ordinance and developing an Inventory of Historical Properties.

Human Relations Commission Established by Ordinance #1696 at the October 5, 2020 Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners, to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing, commercial property and public accommodations within the Township.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Council The Board of Commissioners by resolution dated April 11, 1972, created a committee to advise and aid the Board in connection with the Parks and Recreation programs in the community.

Police and Fire Civil Service Commission The Civil Service Commission is an oversight board created by the Board of Commissioners for the purpose of overseeing the hiring and promotion process within the Township Police and Fire Departments, as required by the Pennsylvania First Class Township Code.

Transportation Impact Advisory Committee The Committee serves in an advisory capacity and develops land use assumptions, conducts roadway sufficiency analysis studies, and makes recommendations as to the development of road improvements, capital improvements, and impact fees within the Township.

Uniform Construction Code Local Appeals Board Established by the Board of Commissioners, to carry out its interests in promoting public health and safety, the Appeals Board hears appeals, requests for variances or extensions of time under the provisions of the Uniform Construction Code and authorizes other necessary action.

Zoning Hearing Board The Board of Commissioners shall appoint by resolution five residents of the Township, none of whom shall hold any other office in the Township, to serve as the Zoning Hearing Board of the Township, each member serving a term of not more than five years in length, with the terms staggered so that the term of office of one member shall expire each year.

Parks and Recreation, Finance, Human Resources, etc.) as well as the police station, was constructed in the late 1960's. Now that the building is over fifty years old, we need to make improvements to ensure that it is fully ADA accessible, its mechanical systems are modern and efficient, security improvements are made to ensure the safety of citizens and township staff and that it is generally prepared to serve our community for another fifty years.

Late last year the township contracted with KCBA Architects to evaluate the Township Building and determine what upgrades and improvements were needed and to evaluate whether additional improvements were needed, particularly with our police station.

The Board of Commissioners is currently evaluating concept plan options. One option currently being evaluated is the renovation of the existing Township Building and the construction of a new, freestanding police station that would be located directly behind the current Township Building. The new police station would face Center Ave.

With the dramatic increases in building materials, estimated construction costs are much greater than originally anticipated. As a result, the Commissioners are not only carefully considering building options, but also trying to determine what the right timing is to undertake such a large project.

American Rescue Act – Federal Funds

As part of the Federal American Rescue Act, Upper Moreland Township received a little under \$2.5 million from the Federal Government. These funds are intended to be spent to address the negative impacts of the COVID pandemic, including the loss of local tax revenue. These funds will be distributed to the township in two disbursements, one in the summer of 2021 (which we have already received) and the other this summer.

A few months ago, the Board of Commissioners approved a budget plan for how to spend the first half of these funds. Approved expenditures include:

- Installation of floodgates on roads that are prone to flooding. This will provide for greater safety during heavy flooding.
- Funds to help the township catch up on the maintenance of its parks and downtown area. Due to hiring freezes and loss of revenue during the pandemic, park and downtown maintenance were deferred.
- Financial contribution to the Second Alarmers Rescue Squad to provide funds for the training, recruitment and retention of emergency medical technicians and paramedics.
- Funds for housing assistance to help individuals and families find affordable rental housing options.
- Funds for tutoring services for township students who were adversely impacted academically during the pandemic.
- A reserve fund to be used as matching funds to secure additional outside grants and financing.

The Board will consider how to allocate the second half of the funding this coming fall.

REAL ESTATE TAX OFFICE

Your 2022 School Real Estate Tax Bill was mailed in July 2022. If you have not received it by mid-July, please call our office at 267-607-1046 or 267-607-1047. Take some time to read the instructions on the bottom of the bill, as it provides some useful information and may answer your questions.

If you have moved and need to have your mailing address changed, we must have a written request to do so. Be sure to include the reason you need the address changed and a contact number where you can be reached.

Your bill includes two copies. We need one copy to post your payment, and the second copy is for your records. If you would like a receipt, please present the entire bill. For those of you who wish to pay by mail and would like a receipt, enclose the entire bill and a stamped, self-addressed envelope. We will mark one copy as your paid receipt and return it to you.

The Real Estate Tax office is located on the first floor

of the Township Building at 117 Park Avenue. Our office hours are 8:30 to 12:00 and 12:30 to 4:00, Monday through Friday. Please note that we do close from 12-12:30 p.m. for lunch.

The Board of School Directors for the Upper Moreland Township School District approved a property tax rebate program that will see a discount of up to \$500 for certain homeowners. The tax program is based upon the existing Pennsylvania Property Tax and Rent Rebate program. Upper Moreland homeowners must qualify for the State rebate program to qualify any District rebate program, but the District is not offering a rent rebate program at this time. To qualify for this program, the household income must be no more than \$35,000 annually, and: be 65 years of age or older; or be a widow or widower aged 50 years of age or older; or, be permanently disabled and 18 years of age or older. Please complete Pennsylvania form, PA-1000, to start the process to see if you qualify.

Once approved by the State and your 2022 school tax is paid, the District application can be completed. The application is available on the School District's website.

Uniform Construction Code Update: Upper Moreland Township follows Act 45 of the Pa. Uniform Construction Code. Upper Moreland Township currently follows the 2018 International Code Council Series as adopted by the state of PA. For more information on Pa Act 45 please visit the Pa. Department of Labor & Industry website at www.dli.pa.gov/ucc/. Information on the ICC codes can be found at www.iccsafe.org/.

Construction Permits: Building codes allow us to rely on the safety of the structures around us in our everyday living. The requirement of construction permits allows the local code officials to administer the provisions of the code to ensure proper construction. If you are planning any kind of home remodeling project or thinking of retaining a contractor to do work for you, please keep these regulations in mind. **Construction Permits** are needed for all repairs, additions, and alterations to properties. This includes work done to roofs, siding, windows, fences, shed, both above and in-ground pools, driveways, driveway aprons, and curbs, as well as interior projects in kitchens, bathrooms, and garages. Permits are not required for replacing gutters or windows of the same size unless a structural alteration is made. Permits are not required for painting, tree removal or pruning. If you are unsure if a permit is required, please take the time to call the Code Enforcement Department at 215-659-3100 for assistance before beginning work. **Permits will only be issued once they have been reviewed for compliance with all local and applicable state regulations.** Fines can be issued for work begun prior to the issuance of the permits required. **Permits** are also needed for work on heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems (including electrical connections to swimming pools and ornamental ponds). **A registered master plumber must do all plumbing projects,** and the plumber must apply directly for the permits required.

Registration of Contractors is required according to the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act of July 2009. All contractors performing home remodeling projects are required to be registered with PA. Attorney General's Office. A copy of state license and insurance certificate shall be submitted to UMT. Commercial contractors, new home builders, and master plumbers must still be licensed with Upper Moreland Township. Please contact the Upper Moreland Township Department of Code Enforcement for information on contractors. For additional information on the Act and to see if your contractor is registered with the state, please visit the Attorney General's website at www.attorneygeneral.gov.

Property Maintenance regulations require that all properties and structures be kept in good repair and maintained in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition. Please trim grass and weeds regularly and remember that growth **in excess of twelve inches** is prohibited. Trash and debris may not be stored on properties at any time. It is also important to make sure that shrubs and trees located near streets do not obscure road signs from the view of motorists or pedestrians. Please prune landscaping to ensure that signs are clearly visible from a distance. Gutters and downspouts should be checked to ensure they are free of debris and properly secured. Please contact a professional contractor specializing in this field. Storm windows, weather stripping, and exterior doors should be

properly sealed to prevent unwanted drafts and heat loss. Please visit the U.S. Dept. of Energy's website for more information (www.energy.gov).

Home Occupations: Residents may operate a business or office from their property, subject to certain restrictions. However, only people living in the dwelling may operate the business or office. No outside storage of material related to the home occupation is permitted. If you are interested in running a business or office from your home, please contact the Code Enforcement Department first, to ensure your plans are in keeping with the Township's guidelines and to obtain the required annual use registration permit. Residences used for in-home day care must meet all Township regulations, including a maximum of six children (four infants) at any one time, and be inspected annually by the Code Enforcement Officer and Fire Marshal. All day care providers must reside in the dwelling. All home occupations, proprietorships, partnerships, corporations, limited liability companies and other entities operating in the Township must also register with the Township's Business Tax Office before beginning operations.

Swimming Pools capable of holding in excess of 24 inches of water require a permit from the Code Enforcement Department. All filter and circulation equipment must be wired in accordance with the 2017 National Electric Code (N.E.C.). All swimming pools requiring a permit must also have a permanent barrier surrounding the pool which is at least four feet high with a self-closing, self-latching gate. Requirement hand-outs are available at the Code Enforcement Office.

Swimming Pool Drainage should be discharged into the sanitary sewer system. Water may be drained indirectly to the storm water system if it has first been de-chlorinated. Township regulations prohibit directing water discharge from swimming pools onto the property of another person without their consent.

Public Nuisances (noise, etc.): The Township often receives complaints from residents concerning inoperable vehicles, excessive noise, and construction work taking place before 7:00 a.m. and after 10:00 p.m. Residents are reminded that **all vehicles** must be operable, have current registration, and a valid inspection sticker unless stored in a completely enclosed building or garage (car covers are not compliant). These are but a few examples of **"public nuisance"** actions that interfere with the repose, health, safety, or life of others. Upper Moreland has adopted regulations to prohibit nuisances such as these, which affect our residents' quality of life.

Portable Storage Units: The Board of Commissioners adopted regulations for portable storage units, dumpsters, and construction trailers placed on any parcel. In addition to the permit requirement, there is a limit on the number of units and time for which they can be placed on the parcel. Please contact the Code Enforcement Office for information and permitting requirements prior to placing these units on your property.

Recreation Vehicles longer than twenty feet must have an annual permit from the Code Enforcement Department if stored on your property for more than two weeks.

HOUSEHOLD TRASH COLLECTION

Regular household trash is collected once each week. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070, Monday through Friday between 6:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., if you are unsure of your pickup day. **Trash containers should be placed at the curb by 6:30 a.m. on your collection day, but not more than 12 hours beforehand.** Empty cans must be removed within 12 hours of collection. **All trashcans must be covered, weigh less than 50 pounds when full, and be no larger than 50 gallons in capacity. Lids must completely detach, not just pivot open** and should have house numbers. Trash placed in boxes or drums will not be collected. If you are placing trash bags curbside, bags must not be more than 20 pounds when full. Garbage must be drained and bagged to delay decomposition. **The Public Works Department does not collect materials related to the demolition, repair, or construction of buildings. This restriction includes, but is not limited to, concrete, plaster, wood, drywall, dirt, fencing, and landscape ties. Homeowners must make arrangements for the disposal of these items.** If you are planning on moving and have a lot of trash, extra volume must be spread out over several pickups. Bedding: box springs and mattresses must be either wrapped in plastic or put into a mattress bag.

If your trash and/or recycling collection is cancelled due to inclement weather, Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 or log onto the Township Web site (www.uppermoreland.org) to find out when your next pickup will occur.



YES

Many residents have trash cans unacceptable for curbside collection. Regulations limit the size of trash cans to 50-gallon capacity and 50-pound weight limit. Lids must completely detach, not just pivot open. These regulations are in place to protect service personnel from injury and thereby make the best use of tax dollars.

YARD/BULK/MISCELLANEOUS COLLECTION

DISPOSAL OF YARD WASTE

With the exception of scheduling changes due to holidays, bagged leaves, grass clippings, and other yard waste will be collected each Monday. Only brown, 30-gallon biodegradable yard waste bags will be accepted. Bags should weigh less than 50 pounds and be placed at the curb by 6:30 a.m., but not more than 12 hours beforehand. The Public Works Department **will not accept** bags that contain dirt, edgings, wood chips, mulch, stump grindings, rocks, or household trash, as these items can cause damage to our recycling equipment and composting program. There is **no limit** to the number of bags that may be placed curbside for collection.



CHANGES TO 2022/23 YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Due to holiday scheduling changes, there will be **NO** yard waste collections on the following Mondays in 2022/23:

GLASS, CAN, PLASTIC, AND PAPER RECYCLING

RECYCLING PROGRAMS

Recyclable materials are collected the same day as your regular household trash. Glass bottles, aluminum and tin cans, #'s 1 through 7 plastics, paper goods, cardboard boxes, and yard waste are included in Upper Moreland Township's recycling program. **RECYCLING OF THESE MATERIALS IS MANDATORY IN UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP.**



Due to automation of recycling collection – **ALL** recyclables (with the exception of yard waste) must now be mixed together **and placed in the 95 gallon recycling containers that are provided by the Township.** This includes glass, bottles, plastics numbered 1-7, tin and aluminum cans, **AND** also paper and cardboard. Cardboard must be cut to fit into the can. ***Please do not stuff the can too full as it will not completely empty. Break cardboard boxes down. You can no longer set out cardboard boxes separately; all cardboard must go into the recycling container. THESE CONTAINERS ARE THE PROPERTY OF UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP AND MUST REMAIN WITH THE PROPERTY IF YOU MOVE.***

Glass, Can, Plastic, and Paper Recycling: Unbroken glass bottles, clean aluminum and tin cans and number's 1 through 7 plastics, newspapers, computer paper, brown bags, magazines, junk mail, office paper, phone books, paperboard cartons or boxes (not wax lined), including those from beverages, six packs, and those used to hold pizza or other fast food items may be mixed together and placed curbside in the recycling containers that are provided by the Township. **NO OTHER CONTAINERS WILL BE ACCEPTED.** No trash, cigarettes, or food/drink residue should be in bottles. No plate glass, light bulbs, mirrors, or broken glass is included in recycling (put in regular trash). Cans that contained paint, fuel, aerosol spray, oil or other hazardous materials cannot be collected. **EXCLUDED:** Styrofoam (includes egg cartons, clamshell containers, plates, cups and meat trays, packing peanuts), plastic films or bags, PVC pipes, CD/DVDs, coffee cup lids, straws, plastic cutlery, plastic 6-pack rings, waxed paper, waxed cardboard, coat hangers.

PROPER PLACEMENT OF RECYCLING CONTAINERS: In order for the recycling container to be accessible to the recycling truck, please place containers with metal bar facing out; they should be placed 3' from cars, poles, and trash bags/cans.

BRUSH AND BRANCHES

In addition to bagged yard waste, brush and branches are also picked up each Monday. Brush and branches should be tied into bundles with manila rope or jute twine. Bundles should weigh less than 50 lbs. and be up to four feet in length and two feet in width. **No more than 6 bundles** should be placed curbside for pickup on each collection day.



LEAVES RAKED TO THE CURB

Leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves raked to the curb on, ***or shortly after,*** the dates listed on the vacuum leaf map for each area of the Township. The Township map, found in this Newsletter, shows each collection by area. **Please DO NOT** rake leaves into the street and **DO NOT** blow or rake sticks, branches, rocks or stones into the piles of leaves to be vacuumed by the Township's machines to ensure the collection equipment is not damaged. The Public Works Department will make every effort to stay on schedule. If you are unsure of your collection area or have any questions concerning the schedule, please call the Public Works Department, Monday thru Friday, between 7:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., at 215-659-4070, for assistance.

ELECTRONICS DISPOSAL

Electronics are part of the recycling program. A permit is required for the disposal of household electronics. "Electronics" include but are not limited to TVs up to 50", Stereos, VCRs, DVD players, computers, keyboards, monitors and microwaves. Permits can be obtained from the receptionist's office at the Township Building, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday - Friday. Permit fees range from \$1.00 to \$20.00. **Please note: Televisions over 50" are the owner's responsibility.** Once a permit is obtained, if the item(s) have "disappeared" from in front of your home **before 6:00 a.m. on the scheduled pickup date**, call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 to cancel the pickup. If the pickup is cancelled **by 6:30 a.m.**, the permit fee will be refunded in full.



DISPOSAL OF CARPETING

Rugs and padding will be picked up on your regular trash day. Rugs and padding must be cut to 4 foot widths, then rolled and tied securely. Each section should weigh less than 20 pounds (**limit 1 room per pickup**).

SAFE DISPOSAL OF HOUSEHOLD SHARPS

Place sharp household objects in a rigid, strong plastic or metal container with a screw-on or tightly secured cap, such as a laundry detergent bottle; or use a purchased sharps container. Reinforce the cap with heavy-duty tape. Mark clearly and noticeably on the outside of the container **"Do Not Recycle"** and **"Household Sharps."** Sharps include medical needles, knitting needles, and knives, among other items.



DISPOSAL OF HOUSEHOLD PAINT

Latex-based paint will be accepted in your regular trash. Paint must be dried and **the lid must be removed. Place paint cans next to your trash cans.** Oil-based paints must be taken to a Montgomery County Household Hazardous Waste Collection site. For more information on the MONTCO Hazardous Waste Collection, call 610-278-3618.

ARE YOU MOVING?

To better serve The Township, the Public Works Department requests that residents who are moving, and have a large volume of trash, spread it out over a period of time. Please try to get rid of all trash prior to your settlement date. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 if you are unsure of what items can be placed curbside.



BULK ITEMS



The Public Works Department assists residents by providing a special service to remove **metal** items such as appliances, grills, lawn mowers, exercise equipment, etc. A pickup for these items can be scheduled by obtaining a **bulk pickup permit** from the receptionist's office at the Township Building. The minimum fee for a bulk pickup permit is \$15.00; the final cost will depend on the type, size, and number of items to be picked up. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 if you are unsure if an item requires a permit. *Please remember that once a permit is issued, a collection date is scheduled. If you find that the item(s) have "disappeared" from in front of your home before 6:00 am on the scheduled pick up date, please call the Public Works Department by 6:30 am to cancel the collection. If the pickup is cancelled by 6:30 am, the permit fee will be refunded in full.*

CHRISTMAS TREES

Christmas trees up to eight feet in height may be placed at the curb for collection on Mondays in January and February. Trees will not be collected on Monday, December 26, Monday, January 2, Monday, January 16, and Monday, February 20 due to holiday scheduling changes.



SNOW PLOWING/SNOW REMOVAL INFORMATION:

The Township's Public Works Department is responsible for plowing and salting the roads in Upper Moreland Township. Salting and cindering begins on primary highways as soon as snow or freezing rain starts to fall. **Plowing begins after 3-4 inches of snow accumulation. After primary routes are clear, plows/salt trucks proceed to dedicated secondary routes.**

Wherever possible, please move your vehicles out of the street and onto private driveways so that plowing and salting operations can be done safely and efficiently. If you cannot move your vehicles to off-street parking spots, please follow the following guidelines to help ensure that plowing and salting covers as much of your street as possible. Unless your street permits parking on one side only, park vehicles on the "even" and "odd" numbered side of the street depending on the year. For example, in 2022 park cars on the EVEN numbered side; and in 2023 park cars on the ODD numbered side.



To avoid having to shovel out your driveway more than once after a storm, follow these tips:

- Wait until after your street has been plowed to shovel the end of your driveway closest to the street.
- When clearing the entrance to your driveway, shovel snow into a pile to the right of the driveway when facing the street and create a small, clear pocket to the left of the driveway for crews to leave snow during plowing.
- Sidewalks must be cleared within 48 hours after the snow, sleet or freezing rain has stopped falling.

It is unlawful to shovel, plow or deposit snow or ice from any driveway, sidewalk, or parking area onto any public street or sidewalk, per Township Ordinance 1569, Article 290-3.

If a snow emergency is declared, all vehicles must be removed from snow emergency routes until the emergency is lifted. Snow Emergencies are announced on Comcast Channel 965 and Verizon Channel 41, and the Township web site: www.uppermoreland.org. Streets signs are posted on those roads designated as snow emergency routes. When a snow emergency is declared, it is done with your safety in mind. In order to make sure emergency vehicles can reach people in need, the snow emergency routes must be cleared of parked cars, and vehicles on the roadways need snow tires or chains. In order to prevent the need for people to walk in the street, sidewalks need to be shoveled quickly.

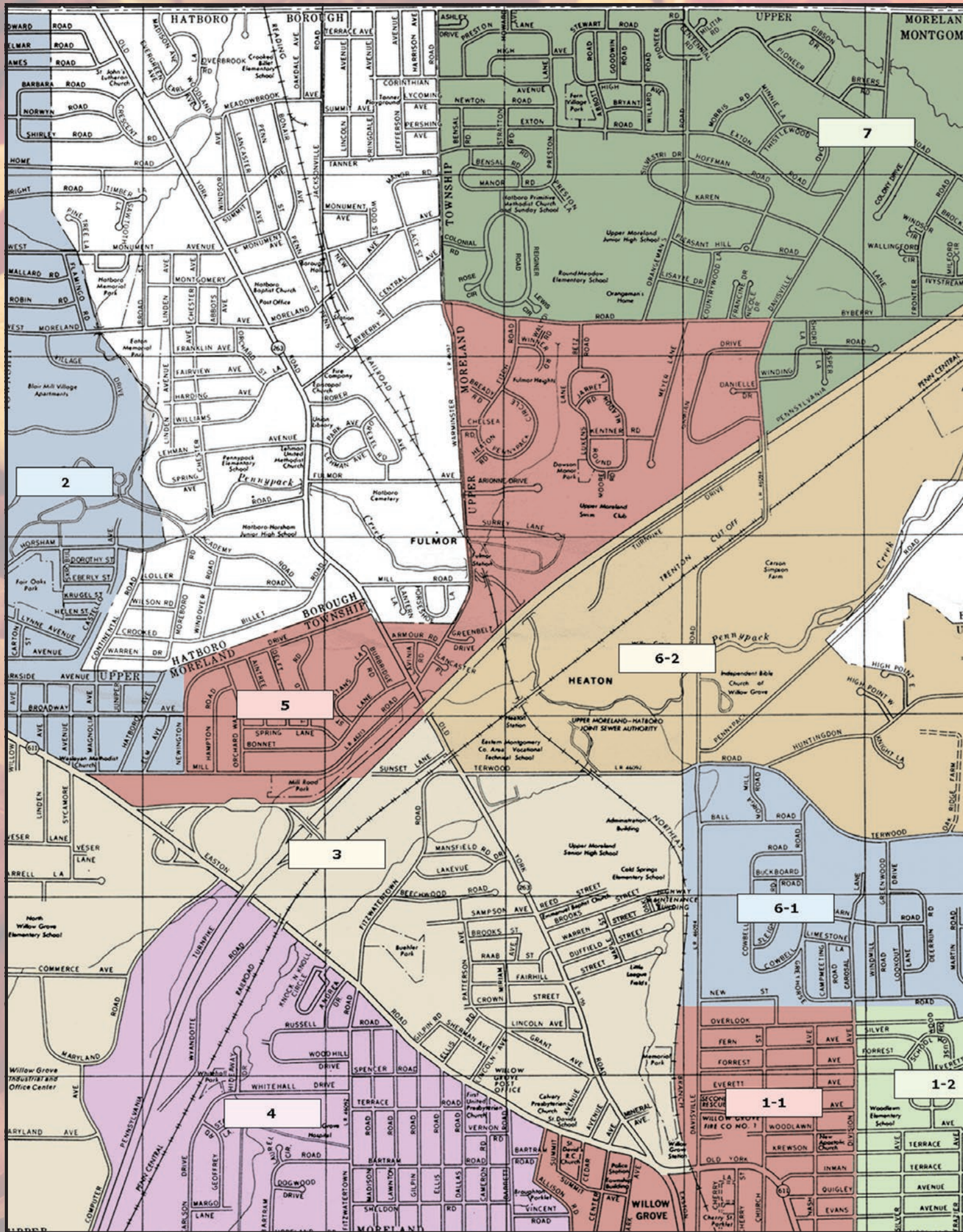

UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Upper Moreland Police Department is proud to announce the hiring of Officer Sidney Schwartz to fill a vacancy within the department. Officer Schwartz was hired from a list of candidates created through an extensive process guided by Civil Service Rules. Candidates were administered a written examination as part of the Montgomery County Consortium of Communities in February of 2022. Following the written examination, candidates scoring within the guidelines of the Civil Service Rules were required to complete and pass a physical training assessment examination. The candidates who passed the physical assessment were then invited to participate in the oral interview process. Candidates were interviewed in March 2022, by a board of sworn officers and a member of the community. Following the oral boards, the scores were tabulated to create an eligibility list for potential employment with the Upper Moreland Township Police Department. The eligibility list was certified by the Civil Service Commission, and candidates were then subjected to an extensive background investigation. The background investigation is conducted by the police department's detective bureau. The background investigation includes, but is not limited to, the candidate's personal and employment history, integrity, honesty, accountability, professionalism, as well as moral and ethical standards. The candidate also undergoes a polygraph examination to determine their honesty, integrity, moral and ethical practices. Once the background investigation is completed, a recommendation to consider the candidate for employment is forwarded to the Board of Commissioners, who then meet with each candidate. The



candidates considered for hiring are provided a conditional offer of employment. The conditional offer is contingent upon the candidate's successfully completing a physical examination and psychological examination. Only when these two examinations are successfully completed is a candidate sworn in as an Upper Moreland Township Police Officer. Officers begin their career in a Field Training Program. The initial phase is a two-week orientation, lasting 80 hours, that is designed to familiarize the new officers with the operation of the Upper Moreland Police Department. This includes introduction to rules and regulations, Use of Force Policies, defensive tactics, and qualification on weapons and the records management system of the department. Following the two-week in-house training phase, the new officer begins the second phase of the Field Training Program, in which the new officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer. During this time the officer is partnered with a Field Training Officer who directly oversees the trainee. Daily evaluations are completed and the trainee receives feedback on performance. In total the FTO Program consists of a total of 584 hours of training.

Officer Sidney Schwartz grew up in Abington, PA, where he graduated from Abington Senior High School in 2015. He furthered his education by attending The Pennsylvania State University, Abington College and graduated in 2018 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice and a minor in Sociology. He began his policing career as an Abington Township Park Ranger and police dispatcher with both Abington and Upper Dublin Police Departments. Officer Schwartz was most recently employed by the City of Philadelphia as a police officer in the 24th District. Officer Schwartz began his Field Training Program in June 2022. We welcome Officer Schwartz to the Upper Moreland Police Department.

Mrs. Doris Hardcastle

At our May public meeting, we presented our annual Honorary Membership Award to Mrs. Doris Hardcastle. We, as a board, nominated Doris for this award in early 2020, and unanimously voted that it was well overdue. Unfortunately, the pandemic hit, delaying this much deserved recognition.

Upper Moreland Historical Association is grateful to have Doris Hardcastle as a member. Doris' roots here run deep, having lived much of her life here in Upper Moreland. Her grandfather had one of the first automobiles in Willow Grove, a 1911 Brush. Doris grew up in a brand-new home on Cherry Street in the early 1930s, and she attended the Davisville Road School. In 1938, she and her family moved to Easton Road.

In high school, she was a plane spotter and spent hours at the American Legion post 305, here in town, watching the skies during World War II to protect our community; though, luckily, she only ever saw friendly aircraft! She also played basketball for Upper Moreland High School and graduated in 1943. For many years, Doris and friends from the class of 1943 met for lunch once a month, maintaining local ties and welcoming any who might be home visiting from out of town.

Doris can recall the days when Mineral Springs Hotel still stood, although it was closed by that time. She enjoyed spending time at Willow Grove Park, which was within walking distance from her house. She fondly recalls corporate picnics with organized games, Wednesday night fireworks, enjoying the rides in the summer, and ice skating on the lakes during the winter. She even forwent new school shoes one year to use her ration card for new ice skates.

Doris has been a devoted congregant of the Willow Grove United Methodist Church since her youth and talks of it with pride in her voice as one of the oldest churches in Willow Grove.

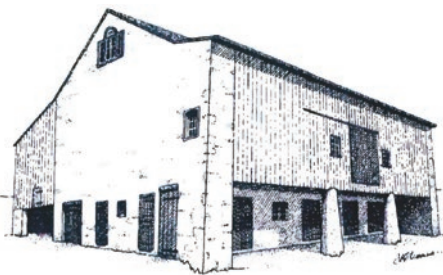
Doris knew her husband, Sam, throughout her school years, as he was a few classes ahead of her. After his time in the service, he went one day into Miller's Drug Store, a popular hangout spot in downtown Willow Grove. Doris was there, working her second job, for 25 cents an hour. He walked her home that day and their relationship grew. Together they lived in various places in the area, but eventually settled back in Doris' childhood home on Easton Road.

She has been a member of UMHA since its founding and it has been our pleasure to see her at nearly every public meeting since we began hosting them. She has donated over 50 objects to our archives, including a thorough oral history that enables us to get a glimpse of what small town Willow Grove used to be.

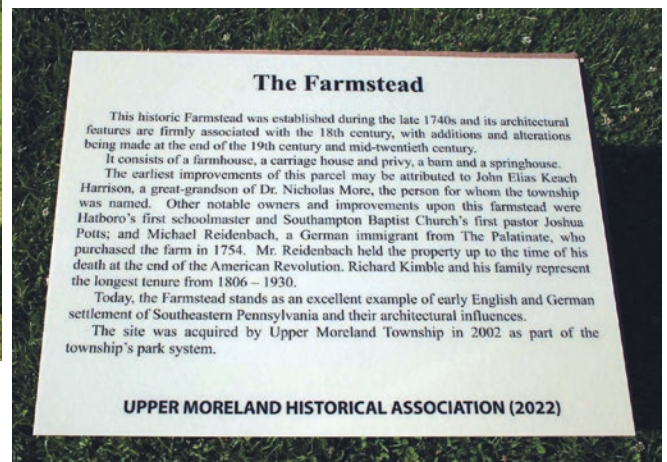

Keep it "messy" for wildlife! As we move into fall, it's important to help wildlife survive through the winter by leaving flower seed heads until spring so birds have a winter food source. Don't rake up leaves! Salamanders, other amphibians and many beneficial insects hibernate under these leaves. We have had a tradition of "cleaning up" our lawns and gardens in the fall but nature doesn't do this. No one rakes leaves in a forest! You can save yourself lots of time by leaving most of the leaves on your lawn until late spring, then just mow them into the lawn with a mulching mower. This will add nutrients to the lawn and help it retain moisture. Not mowing until late spring is also a great way to help native bees and other pollinators. Mysteries of Upper Moreland: Inside the Ehrenpfort Building by Jacqueline Cherepinsky

Ever since I watched the film *National Treasure*, starring Nicolas Cage, I have been (not so secretly) wishing to find something, as Benjamin Gates would describe, of "historic and intrinsic value." So, when I was invited to explore the unoccupied second floor of the Ehrenpfort building, I jumped at the opportunity. What I discovered during this visit was that the second floor of the Ehrenpfort building was once home to the Old York Road Jewish Community Center (now Temple-Beth Am in Abington) and that the building has been around since the late nineteenth century.

The mission of this visit was to see if there was any structural evidence of the Jewish Community Center left in the building. Since the second floor was occupied by offices for several decades, most of the building received renovations and left no proof of religious worship or community gathering. There appeared to be markings on a doorframe that could have been the location where a mezuzah was once placed but overall, the visit seemed unfruitful.

When all hope seemed lost, I saw an original door inside the building. It had nothing to do with Judaism, but it caught my eye because it was old and sealed with shelves blocking it. I could not figure out what was beyond that door. The only glimpse I could get was through an old keyhole. This was the kind of keyhole authors write about in fantasy or scary stories, where the door leads to something magical or something dark and sinister. I tried to use my camera to take photos through the keyhole, and while they confirmed another room, I could not figure out what I was looking at. I tried to pull off the shelves so I could get to the door but to no avail. Most normal people would think, "maybe this door is sealed for a reason, and I should not tamper with it." It was

at that moment that I realized if I were in a horror film, I would be the first to die.

Finally, walking through a maze of rooms, I found the other side. Unfortunately, it was just a room with old office equipment. The door was sealed at some point to split up the space for various businesses. While that outcome was disappointing, I look back and think to myself, "what a thrill." This made me realize that although I did not find any relics or treasures, our community is filled with such a rich history. There are adventures out there in Upper Moreland, and we just need to find them.

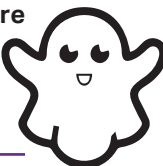

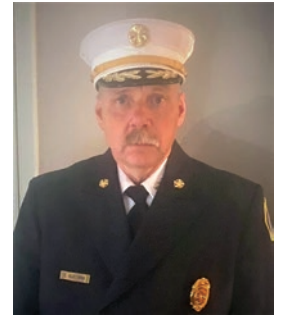
UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP EMERGENCY SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The Upper Moreland and Willow Grove Fire Department is made up of career and volunteer staff that responded to nearly 2000 calls for service in 2021. At the beginning of this year, the township commissioners hired our first-ever career fire chief, to bring both components of the agency together and provide an improved level of service to our community.

As of April 4, 2022, the department now maintains firefighters on duty 24 hours per day, 5 days per week, in the station ready to respond instantly to many various types of emergencies in the community. The goal of this transition is to arrive at any emergency, as fast as possible, to provide any needed lifesaving measures that will make Upper Moreland one of the safest communities in the state of Pennsylvania.

The members of the Willow Grove Fire Company also provide full coverage on weekends and additional support during the week.

The department consists of a Chief, two Battalion Chiefs, one Captain, two Lieutenants, one Administrative Assistant, and many Firefighters, both career and volunteer. Our organization is considered a combination department because we utilize both career and volunteer personnel to deliver our services in the most cost-efficient manner.

The Fire Department is also responsible for fire inspections in the township that are completed by the on-duty personnel. Members also gain information about the occupancies in the community, in case there is ever an incident at one of the locations that were inspected.

The Willow Grove Fire Department is always seeking any community resident interested in volunteering for the department and community. Simply stop at the station and speak with any member.

Last, but surely not least, the department is privileged to have Mary Schroepe as our Administrative Assistant, to service both the Fire Department and office of the Fire Marshal. Mary does great work with the residents, businesses, and our department.

As winter approaches, please take some time to clean and inspect your fireplace chimney and any heating appliances to make sure they are operating properly and safely as recommended by the manufacturer.

Burning of loose leaves, yard trimmings, garbage, or household trash is illegal in Upper Moreland Township. In addition to the concern about the fire extending to a structure or an ember igniting a fire, health concerns relative to smoke inhalation can also be serious. If you should see this burning occurring, please call 9-1-1, give the address, and report the condition.

Hot ashes from wood stoves or fireplaces must be placed in a metal container and stored 10 ft. away from any nearby building.

Upper Moreland Township is served by a combination of Career and Volunteer Firefighters. Career Firefighters are on duty Monday thru Friday 6:00 A.M. thru 6:00 P.M. Volunteer Firefighters cover weeknights, weekends and holidays. This combination service provides public safety education and emergency response to the residents, businesses and visitors of the Township.

There are two municipal fire stations located within the township. The main station is located at 227 Davisville Road and a second station is located at 4355 Davisville Road.

Smoke Alarms



Smoke Alarms are a key part of your fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly. Test your alarms and change your batteries regularly.

Cooking



Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries. The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Always stay in the kitchen while cooking food.

Open Burning



Open burning is restricted within the Township. Contact the Fire Marshal's Office at 267-607-1030 for specific requirements. A Fire Official is authorized to order the extinguishment of open burning at any time.
